- 1. Tell me some of the jungle animals that you saw. (butterflies, jaguars, parakeets, monkeys)
- 2. Which animal did you like best?
- 3. Of all the animals you saw, which ones were Australian? (bandicoot, wallaby, wombat, kangaroo)
- 4. If you could have a dinosaur as a pet, which one would you choose? Why?

Respond

Invite your child/children to share their understanding of the meanings of the rare words in the story, e.g. "I wonder what this word means?"

| Rare word | Synonym | Rare word | Synonym |
|-----------|----------------------------|-----------|---|
| drift | float | snort | snuffle, make a loud noise as you breathe |
| prowl | lie in waiting | gobble | eat quickly |
| squawk | screech, shriek | graze | eat by cropping the grass |
| howl | cry, scream, wail | swoop | dive, pounce |
| glide | float, slide, slither | gnash | grind or clench teeth |
| rock | shake, move back and forth | stampede | rush in a panic |
| toboggan | slide | attack | hit or strike something |

Extend

- Explore the environmental and geographical locations in this text.
 - Set up small world play with plastic dinosaurs/animals, coloured fabrics, paper, playdough, small stones on a plastic tray or play table.
 - o Create an arctic world using coloured blocks of ice (made with an ice cube tray, takeaway or 2 litre ice cream container) on a plastic tray or in a plastic box outside. Add plastic figurines of whales, penguins, walrus, sea birds etc. Hide some objects in ice for your child/children to discover and discuss ways to problem-solve removing figures from the ice. Use the prompt, 'I wonder what we could do?' as a discussion starter.
 - Support your child/children to do an online search on an animal they may be particularly interested in.
 Explore its habits, diet, movements and sounds.
